Welcome from the International Lifesaving Federation (ILS)

The International Federation was established in 1910 and is now representing an estimate of over 30 million lifesavers and lifeguards in over 130 countries. They all have one objective: the preservation of human life in the aquatic environment. Sports competitions are organized under the motto « fit to save a life » and it is in this context that our championships must be seen. Lifesaving sport has both sports and humanitarian goals.

About the ILS and international lifesaving sports

By the time you read this article, somewhere in the world, somebody will have drowned. The International Life Saving Federation has found that yearly over one million people drown, which is one every 30 seconds. The World Health Organisation is ranking drowning as the second leading cause of accidental death worldwide.

The mission of the International Life Saving Federation (ILS) is to enhance the safety and preservation of human life in the aquatic environment by:

- Co-ordinating and facilitating the work of national lifesaving organisations
- Facilitating and developing exchange of information and research and dissemination of best practices
- Working with member organisations to establish and support lifesaving organisations in geographic areas where they do not now exist
- Developing lifesaving by acting as the International Federation for lifesaving sport
- Co-operating with other international bodies with shared goals

The ILS was formed in February 1993, with headquarters in Belgium, but did not come into force until a General Assembly in September 1994. It brought together lifesaving bodies from all over the world for the first time: the European nations which had previously existed under the FIS (Federation Internationale de Sauvetage) umbrella, and those which formerly constituted World Life Saving (WLS), including Australia, the USA, England, New Zealand, South Africa, and a number of Asian nations. As the new umbrella organisation, ILS brought together still-water and surf lifesaving events in international competition on a larger scale than ever before.

Australia had played a major role in the founding of WLS in 1971, and maintained a strong international presence during the 1970s and '80s. In the 1990s, it continued to play leading roles in the new organisation, with Kevin Weldon AM appointed the founding

president, and Alan Whelpton AM elected chair of competition. In 2000, Alan Whelpton, upon retiring from the position of President of Surf Life Saving Australia (SLSA), was made President of ILS. A position he held until 2008.

As they had done in WLS, Australian delegates to ILS continued to emphasise the importance of international lifesaving sport throughout the 1990s – keeping in mind its attractiveness to current and future Australian surf lifesavers – although since it was one of the fundamental aspects of the new organisation, there was little conflict over this.

While FIS and WLS traditionally held their own Lifesaving World Championships, the first 'Rescue' event held by ILS was in the UK in 1994. Since then, ILS World Championships have been held in Durban, Auckland, Sydney, Daytona, Viareggio, Melbourne (Geelong/Lorne), Berlin/Warnemünde, Alexandria, Egypt and is held now in Adelaide.

Whereas Australia had once dominated WLS competition, the equal emphasis on pool competition as well as surf under ILS meant that if Australia wanted to continue its dominance in international competition, its competitors had to become just as skilled in the pool as they were in the surf. Following the first loss by an Australian team at Rescue 98 in New Zealand, Australia did just that, proceeding to develop a 'high performance programme' which would help elite Australian competitors develop and improve their pool skills.

The consistently high ranking of SLSA in international competition, coupled with similarly impressive achievements of Royal Life Saving Australia (RLSSA), led to the merging of the two teams at the ILS Championships in Viareggio, Italy in 2004. This means that there is now one Australian team comprising members of SLSA and RLSSA competing at any ILS event.

Rescue 2012 will see a massive number of countries, teams and competitors taking part, and is testament to the growing popularity and importance of lifesaving sports around the world.



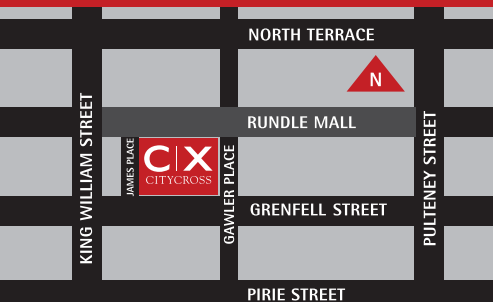


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Who to look out for at Rescue 2012



Nikki Cox, New Zealand

Don't be fooled by her shy and modest exterior off the water. Those that have seen Nikki Cox compete know she holds nothing back when it comes to her sport.

The 27 year-old from Napier began surf lifesaving when she was 15 years-old, following in her sister's footsteps. She had her first taste of international competition at the 2003 Tri-nations and she hasn't looked back since. Nikki now calls Wellington home where she works full time as an accountant.

She admits accounting and surf lifesaving may seem like a bit of a contrast. "The other day my workmate asked me if I'd been punched- I'd come into work in the morning after training with goggle marks around my eyes." But Nikki says a lot of the skills she uses in accounting helps with her training.

"Being organised is critical; you have to be on to it with time management and working out your priorities. Things don't always go to plan but I try to fit it all in," she says.

The cooler Wellington waters may make it harder to stay warm but Nikki still finds time to put herself through an intensive training routine.

Rescue 2012 will be the fourth time Nikki has represented New Zealand. In 2006 she won the ski race title and in 2008 she took the title in the board race. She has learnt from the past and knows what she has to improve on following the last competition in Egypt in 2010.

"It's been such a busy year- I've put a lot of time and effort into my preparation and I want it to pay off."

The New Zealand team are focussed on taking the title from the Aussies on their home turf and Nikki reckons they've got the skills to do it.

"We've got a good mix of athletes and the desire is there to do the job. If we all do our part we can go in there and take it away."

Jordan Caldwell, Australia

Jordan Caldwell may have just turned 19, however he is still Australia's fastest man on sand after a thrilling dead-heat finish with New Zealand champion Kodi Harmon at the 2012 Aussies at North Kirra, defending his crown he won when he stunned a red-hot open field at just 17 years of age in 2011. Jordan left the beach in 2012 with the coveted double after later winning the under 19 title.

The Adelaide based sprinter of Jamaican heritage, is one of Australia's most exciting sprint talents, representing Australia in Japan at the 2012 Sanyo Bussan Cup in September and will compete in Australias Under 20 (16-19 years) team in his home city for Rescue 2012. On the track, Jordan has his sights set on the 2014 Commonwealth Games in Glasgow and the 2016 Olympics in Rio. He was recently named as the inaugural recipient of the Jarryd Hayne Scholarship to place an Australian in the 100m final in 2016 – our first since Ben Hogan in 1956. This super talent from Grange Surf Life Saving Club just might have the calibre to create his little slice of history.

Speaking from Adelaide just 6 weeks before Rescue 2012 was due to commence, Jordan said 'he cannot wait to get out in front of his home town crowd', hoping the home ground advantage will help to give him the edge against his competitors.



Ellie Parker, Great Britain

Eighteen year old Ellie Parker first visited Australia when she was 12, on a month's holiday to the Gold Coast. Starting Nippers aged 11, relatively late for Nippers, Ellie immediately took to it – she loved the beach and had always been a good swimmer, albeit in a pool, and was encouraged to try Surf Life Saving at Woolacombe, north Devon.

Visiting Kurrawa during a Gold Coast family holiday aged 12, Ellie was invited to join the club training for the month: "I just joined in with the club training like everyone else – I loved it, and I'm sure it inspired me to go further" she says.

After a successful summer in England competing – Ellie won four titles at the British Youth championships and the board race title at the Open championships, and enjoyed top two finishes in many other events.

"I can't wait to get to Adelaide – I wish we could just get out there now" she said back in late September. After returning from the Sanyo youth cup in Japan also in September, Ellie was keen to start pitching herself against the open competitors: "It was brilliant in Japan, competing against the Aussie under 20 team, but now I'm raring to see how I compare against the big boys in the open."

Ellie loves to meet people from all over the world at events and after Rescue 2012, she will be staying on to train at Kurrawa again. "I'm going to train pretty much the whole time", she says, "I can't wait to get out there".

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Rescue 2012 Venues – World Class Venues for International Competition

Rescue 2012 will take place across three venues in Adelaide; Glenelg Beach, Christies Beach and the newly developed state of the art South Australian State Aquatic & Leisure Centre at Marion.

Glenelg Beach

Glenelg Beach will host the National Team Ocean and Beach competition in conjunction with the Inflatable Rescue Boat Championships on November 10 and 11. A picturesque setting, Glenelg will provide the ideal venue, boasting a beautiful wide beach setting, grassed reserves and a selection of cafes, bars and restaurants.

Glenelg will also host the Masters and Interclub Beach competitions at twilight. To assist with competitors moving from one venue to the other, shuttle bus services will be provided to officials and competitors. Free public transport will be accessible with a competitor lanyard.

As well as competition, Glenelg will be the accommodation hub for competitors and ILS delegates, with the official ILS Meetings taking place in the Stamford Grand, Moseley Square.

In the midst of all the action at Glenelg is the Glenelg Surf Life Saving Club, providing fantastic views of the beach and surrounding areas. Visitors are welcome to enjoy the facilities upstairs at the surf club, stay for a drink or order something from the delicious menu.

facilities, the centre is equipped with a 50 metre Competition pool and a 55 metre Diving and Water Polo pool.

Compliant with the requirements of the world swimming governing body FINA for Diving, Water Polo, Synchronized and Open Water swimming, the pool has already hosted the Australian Swimming Championships, the Australian National Age Championships and numerous other Australian national pool events.

The centre also features a well-equipped health club, a group fitness studio and function rooms – in which competitors can pay to use should they wish.

Event descriptions

POOL EVENTS

SIMULATED EMERGENCY RESPONSE COMPETITION (SERC)

The Simulated Emergency Response Competition tests the initiative, judgment, knowledge, and abilities of four lifesavers who, acting as a team, apply lifesaving skills in a simulated emergency situation unknown to them prior to the start. This competition is judged within a two-minute time limit. All teams respond to the identical situation and are evaluated by the same judges.

200 m OBSTACLE SWIM

The competitor swims 200m in freestyle during which he/she swims under eight immersed obstacles.

4x50 m OBSTACLE RELAY

Four competitors swim 50m freestyle each passing under two obstacles.

The competitor swims 25 m freestyle and then dives to recover a submerged manikin to the surface within 5 m of the pick-up line. The competitor then carries the manikin to the finish edge of the pool.

100 m MANIKIN TOW WITH FINNS

The competitor swims 50 m freestyle with fins and rescue tube. After touching the turning edge, the competitor fixes the rescue tube around a manikin floating at the surface at the edge and tows it to the finish.

100 m MANIKIN CARRY WITH FINNS

The competitor swims 50 m freestyle wearing fins and then dives to recover a submerged manikin to the surface within 10 m of the turning edge. The competitor carries the manikin to the finish edge of the pool.

100 m RESCUE MEDLEY

The competitor swims 50m freestyle to turn, dive, and swim underwater to a submerged manikin located at 17.5 m distance. The competitor surfaces the manikin within the 5 m pick-up line, and then carries it the remaining distance to the finish edge of the pool.

4x50 m MEDLEY RELAY

The first competitor swims 50 m freestyle without fins. The second competitor swims 50 m freestyle with fins. The third competitor swims 50 m freestyle pulling a rescue tube and after having touched the wall, passes the harness of the rescue tube to a fourth competitor who wears fins. The third competitor, playing the role of "victim" holds the rescue tube with both hands, while being towed 50 m by the fourth competitor to the finish.

200 m SUPER LIFESAVER

The competitor swims 75 m freestyle and then dives to recover a submerged manikin. The competitor surfaces the manikin within 5 m of the pick-up line and carries it to the turning edge. After touching the wall the competitor releases the manikin. In the water, the competitor dons fins and rescue tube within 5 m of the turning edge and swims 50 m freestyle. After touching the wall the competitor fixes the rescue tube around a floating manikin within 5 m of the turning edge and tows it to touch the finish edge of the pool.

LINE THROW

In this timed event, the competitor throws an un-weighted line to a fellow team member located in the water approximately 12m distant and pulls this "victim" back to the poolside.

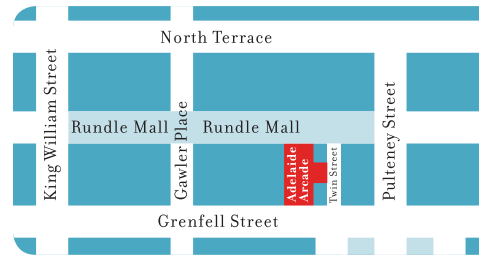

Life Saving and Sport Development Program

Prior to the commencement of Rescue 2012, Surf Life Saving Australia will host a Life Saving and Sport Development Program, inviting fourteen teams from developing nations to participate in the program which will run from Sunday 4 November through to Tuesday 6 November.

At Rescue 2006 in Geelong - Victoria, the first ever international Life Saving and Sport Development Program was held with support offered to nine international teams. The program has significantly grown and at Rescue 2012, Surf Life Saving Australia will offer over 130 competitors and officials from fourteen nations the opportunity to participate in three days of coaching and development clinics aimed at enhancing their life saving skills.

Objectives of the program include promotion of the International Life Saving Federation (ILS) Strategic goals by helping to build capacity to reduce drowning within targeted at risk communities of the World, increase participation in lifesaving sport and support a legacy of development.



The three day coaching program for athletes as well as coaches is designed to improve skills and techniques, allowing for participants to become more competitive and adaptive to the different types of equipment and gear used in ILS lifesaving events.

The ambition is to establish an ongoing legacy that will enable the participating countries to improve their ability and skills to increase the level of competition in their home country and lend them to be more competitive at a regional and international level in lifesaving sport.

The invited nations were selected upon consideration of the following;

- Each Country is a Developing Nation under the ILS and United Nations definition
- Each Country is a full member of the International Life Saving Federation
- There is a capacity in each Country for the need to build life saving as a sport
- Each Country requires financial assistance to attend Rescue 2012

Following the completion of the coaching clinics, all nations will participate in the National Teams competition, competing against the cream of the crop in international life saving.

The Life Saving and Sport Development program has been made possible through the generous financial support of the South Australian Tourism Commission and Surf Life Saving Australia, enabling organizers to offer competitors full flight assistance.

Further financial support to specific countries was applied for through successful grants including the Australia Malaysia Institute and the Australia Indonesia Institute.

Supporters of the program include Kanga Coachlines who are offering transport assistance, the South Australian State Aquatic & Leisure Centre through the support of subsidized pool booking rates and Adelaide Shores Caravan Park through support of subsidized accommodation rates.

Norm Farmer, General Manager Strategic Development at Surf Life Saving Australia has been heavily involved in delivering the program believes "it will provide vital skills and knowledge to those emerging lifesaving organizations that are challenged with high rates of death through drowning, injury and limited resources. Their enthusiasm to learn and participate will surely be an inspiration to all".

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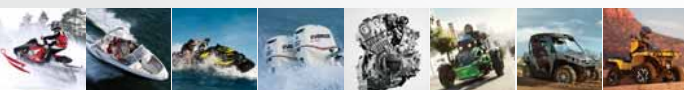

- Winelovers shouldn't miss **Penfolds Magill Estate** – a winery in the suburbs! The spiritual home of Australia's most famous wine – Penfolds Grange – is a historic & beautiful winery. You can visit the tasting room in the former Still Room any time, or take a tour.
- **Take the tram to Glenelg** and experience the shopping, dining and great beaches in this vibrant seaside suburb.



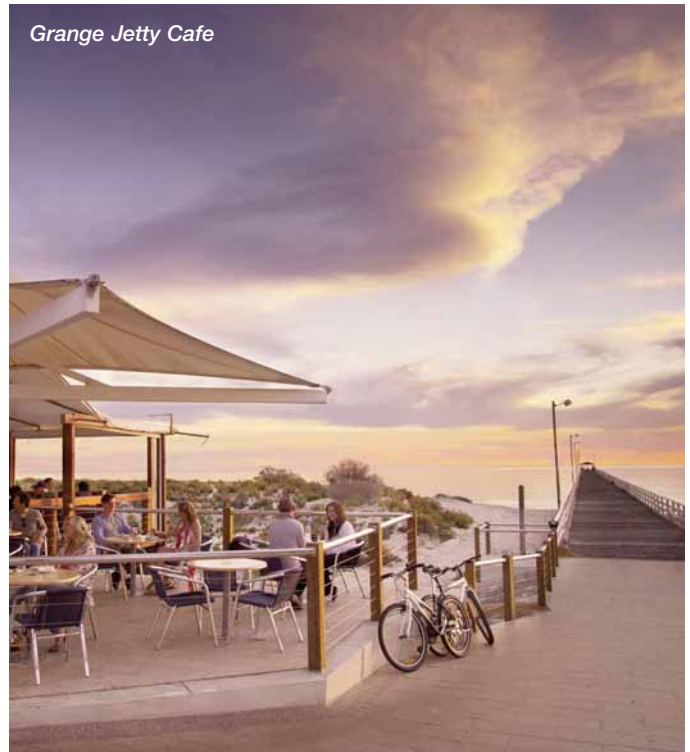
Southern Ocean Lodge, Kangaroo Island

- For the ultimate in foodie bliss, take a gourmet tour with Mark Gleeson, of Chef's Media Tours, around the **Adelaide Central Market** – the largest fresh produce market in the southern hemisphere.
- Another unforgettable Adelaide experience is the **Bush Tucker tour** with Aboriginal guide Hayden Bromley, of Bookabee Tours, which takes you around the beautiful Adelaide Botanic Garden to taste Indigenous berries and see the trees from which boomerangs are made.
- For art-lovers, **JamFactory Contemporary Craft & Design** is a must-visit, with the best in SA designers' glass, ceramics & jewellery on show. Watch glass blowing or call about a tour.
- Enjoy a free, self-guided walk at **Warramong Wildlife Sanctuary** between 9am and 4pm or take a guided dawn or nocturnal tour to see bilbies, wallabies & the elusive platypus.
- **Learn to Surf** with the friendly Surf & Sun crew on the Fleurieu Peninsula as they introduce you to the world of surfing. It's great fun, and the exhilaration of standing up on your board for the first time just can't be beat.
- **Adelaide Zoo** is only one of a handful of locations around the world to be home to two Giant Pandas. For a once-in-a-lifetime experience, go behind the scenes with a Giant Panda Keeper on a VIP Panda Tour and experience an unique opportunity to enter the Giant Panda headquarters to see Wang Wang and Fun up close.
- **Blue Water Sea Kayaking** is an eco-adventure on the Port River. Paddle through the mangroves and get up close with fish, birds and dolphins.
- **Adelaide Warbirds Joy Flights** at Parafield Airport allow you to take to the skies in an ex-military fighter plane. An adrenalin rush is guaranteed.

In Adelaide, you'll find entire streets devoted to dining and after-dark fun. These 'eat streets' are a mix of cafes, pubs and restaurants.

Dining and Nightlife

- **Gouger Street** is Adelaide's key eat street. It's the gateway to the Adelaide Central Market and the exotic, bustling mall and foodhalls of Chinatown. Take a five-minute stroll and you'll be embarking on a world tour of restaurants. Traditional Thai, Vietnamese, Malaysian and Japanese, Asian fusion, noodle bars, regional Chinese and yum cha, French and Argentine cuisine, and a number of first-rate seafood restaurants.
- **Rundle Street**, in Adelaide's East End, has a popular casual atmosphere and is recommended for lunch and night dining. It's bursting with alfresco dining – a vibrant food, wine and coffee experience not to be missed. At night it comes alive with great pubs and several clubs that will have you dancing until the wee small hours.
- Nearby **Hutt Street** is one of Adelaide's leading 'eat streets' and located on the edge of the city centre. It offers a classy yet laidback atmosphere, with well-known restaurants including Chianti Classico, Citrus, GoodLife Modern Organic Pizza, House of Chow and more.
- **Hindley Street** is home to a thriving artistic community by day, and a great range of clubs and bars by night. Whether you want a pint and some live music in a pub, or a chance to



indulge in exotic cocktails and kick back to a DJ set, this is the place that is open until late.

Further Afield

For those wanting to escape the city, Adelaide is conveniently located close to all of the state's most recognised destinations, including the Barossa and Kangaroo Island. Within an hour are some of the best wineries in Australia, fabulous regional farmers markets, world-renowned natural attractions and unique adventures.

Just 30 minutes away from the city, the **Adelaide Hills** is a burgeoning cool climate wine region that now offers more than 30 cellar doors. Known for its fresh local produce, the Hills features must visit cafes and restaurants such as Locavore, The Organic Market Café and Aldgate Provide, plus plenty of welcoming little villages with great shopping.

The world renowned **Barossa** is an hour from Adelaide and is a must-visit destination. Make your own red wine blend at Penfolds, explore the region on a three wheeled motorbike, or take to the air for an exhilarating helicopter ride or drift along in a hot air balloon.

Also within an hour of Adelaide is the magnificent **Fleurieu Peninsula** – where the vines meet the coast in a celebration of good food, wine and culture. Visit the award winning Willunga Farmers Market, take an art class at Red Poles, learn to surf at Middleton Beach and enjoy fine regional dining at Fino, The Salopian Inn or d'Arry's Verandah.

South Australia is renowned for its prolific free roaming wildlife. Head to **Kangaroo Island** to see koalas, sea lions, dolphins, emus, kangaroos, wallabies, penguins and seals in the wild, plus explore some of the nation's best footprint-free beaches.

A little bit about the Council regions

City of Marion

Sandwiched between the sapphire blue waters of St Vincent Gulf and the rolling green Adelaide Hills, Marion is a cosmopolitan city waiting to be discovered.

No trip to Marion is complete without a visit to the hidden oasis of the Warriparinga wetlands, which houses the Living Kurna Cultural Centre.

The wetlands, located on a 3.5 hectare reserve on the corner of Sturt and Marion roads, is a meeting and ceremonial site for indigenous groups and is the gateway to the Tjilbruke dreaming story. About 8000 trees and shrubs have been planted in the wetland, which is home to diverse birdlife.

The Living Kurna Cultural Centre was built to ensure the indigenous culture and the Dreaming stories of the land were passed from generation to generation.

Stories of early European settlers can be traced at the Marion Historical Village with visitors encouraged to take a self-guided walking tour. Don't miss Annie Doolan's cottage, built in 1876 as a convent and school for Mary Mackillop's sisters of St Joseph.

Soak up stunning cliff top views of St Vincent Gulf on the 7km Marion Coastal Park walk, which features 600 million year old glaciers and provides the habitat for local wildlife. The walk, starting at either Marion Esplanade or Hallett Cove, is a great work out.

City of Holdfast

Holdfast Bay is one of Adelaide's premier seaside destinations. Located 20 minutes southwest of the central business district and directly accessible by the Glenelg tram, the region stretches along nine kilometres of stunning South Australian coastline.

Glenelg is a shopper's paradise as well as an exciting entertainment destination. A short stroll from the beach takes shopping lovers to quality stores and cutting-edge boutiques offering a wide range of seaside shopping experiences.

There are a huge range of popular eateries and venues offering fine food and fantastic entertainment that can be capped off with an ice cream and a walk at the water's edge.

South Australia was proclaimed as a colony under Glenelg's own historic Old Gum Tree in 1836. The event established the region as a cosmopolitan destination of choice for those seeking sun, fun and a relaxed lifestyle.

City of Onkaparinga

Just a short distance from the Adelaide CBD, it is both a liveable city and an accessible tourism destination. The area is rich in natural beauty with picturesque hills, trailing rivers, acclaimed vineyards and more than 30 kms of pristine coastline.

While you are here, take some time to enjoy some of the unique experiences—journey the Onkaparinga River by kayak, visit wetlands filled with local wildlife and vegetation communities, adventure flights, wine tours or snorkelling to discover the famous Star of Greece ship wreckage.

Explore the region on your own steam with dedicated sealed walking/cycling paths including the 37 km Coast to Vines Rail Trail where you can stop and enjoy world class McLaren Vale wines in cellar doors along the way.

The stunning beaches and clear gulf waters attract beachgoers for many different activities including swimming, scuba diving, snorkelling, surfing, windsurfing and fishing.

The outstanding food and wine of the region offers visitors a range of options, cafes, restaurants, fine dining, cellar doors and markets, to experience renowned fresh produce.

To see some of our amazing local talent and work be sure to visit the Port Noarlunga Arts Centre and Stump Hill art gallery at the McLaren Vale Visitor Centre.

The McLaren Vale & Fleurieu Visitor Information Centre is an invaluable first step in any visitor's journey. The centre provides friendly regional tourist information, café, playground, cellar door, art gallery and a **FREE accommodation and tour booking service**. Accommodation is available to suit every taste and budget: caravan parks, hotels, motels, holiday homes and bed and breakfasts.
